Every student in grades 6-12 has heard of the illustrious CDT's. Students who have taken the test know that it is a 50-60 question assessment that gives students insight on what will be assessed in the keystone exams. CDT's, otherwise known as "Classroom Diagnostic Tools," are used in the state of Pennsylvania for the purpose of guided instruction and remediation. In other words, this evaluation is used not just to test students knowledge, but to help the teachers educate the students better with the information acquired from the test. Although these assessments take one or two class periods, they are crucial to the growth and development of students, teachers, and the curriculum they teach.

We had an interview with our vice principal, Mr. Vukovcan, about his thoughts on the CDT's. In his opinion, these tests benefit the teachers greatly with creating or modifying curriculum. It helps the teachers in our school create a better and more thorough remediation program as well. Mr. Vukovcan also stated that, "It [the CDT] gives students more prep and practice in dealing with standardized tests." In other words, he believes that the CDT's help students prepare for their future exams as well as giving them a benchmark of their academic ability. Even though the CDT's happen multiple times a school year, this classroom tool is beneficial for students and teachers alike. The goal is for everyone to be prepared and pass the Keystone exams.

The New High School “Epidemic”

The Truth Behind Vaping

Many sources in the world have been showing a rise in the new “epidemic” known as vaping. Vaping uses an electronic system to heat up juices and oils to turn them into a vapor. Many of these products are nicotine based and targeted towards the smoker as their consumer. With some teens, being adventurous, they began using the devices in new ways. One of these include vaping an oil known as THC. THC is a marijuana based oil designed to be used in an e-cigarette device. To know the true purpose behind these devices, however, we will have to explain how it all started.

Vaping is one topic frequently talked about in news sources, but the idea goes back much further than one would think. The concept can be brought back as early as 1927 when Joseph Robinson had the idea of smokeless tobacco. However, the idea was not completed within his time. Most did not die, and all but 26 were cured. The numbers are a lot lower than they seem and with real epidemics like diabetes and climate change, this is not something that should be considered as an epidemic. More people die from cigarettes every year than there are incidents with vaping, but neither are good for your health. With these simple facts, it is clear that this epidemic is not as terrifying as it seems.

of some veterans, really formed together and built confidence as of late."


