


IN OUR HIGH SCHOOL:

In the morning, the entire high school staff created lessons and assignments in their classes that were aligned to the Chapter 339 Career






and Technical Education Standards. Then in the afternoon, students were

On Thursday, April 18, **Mrs. Hufnagle's Child Development** students headed to Center Grange for an afternoon of reading. They read their own children's books to the kindergarten students to help develop and improve language skills. Child Development students learned about cognitive development and the importance of literacy to a child's development. Students then wrote and illustrated their own children's books. Prior to visiting Center Grange, the students learned how to read to young children.

Earth Day Field Trip

The Shell Polymers Monaca plant hosted 26 students from Mr. Whipkey's AP Environmental Science class and **Ms. Delon's** FBLA club on a tour of the inner workings of the Cracker Plant on Monday, **April 22**, Earth Day. Students were given a technical tour of the processes that take place at the plant as Ethane is brought in, changed through heating and cooling to Ethene, then to Ethylene and then finally to Polyethylene, a raw material that other plastics manufacturer's use to make plastic bottles and containers.

The students were taken to the \$1.1 million Shell Center for Process Technology on the campus of CCBC. The new program, which partners with local industry leaders, prepares students for careers in regional technology-driven fields such as the



petrochemical and manufacturing industries.

The new building will facilitate hands-on learning with technology, simulating real-world equipment commonly used by the local industrial community. This approach strengthens the pipeline of CCBC graduating students to the





Western Pennsylvania industrial corporations for future employment. The students had a great time at the Shell Polymers Monaca Plant. It was a great learning experience for all!

BEYOND THE CLASSROOM:

Central Valley High School Students Offered Free Tax Preparation

Central Valley students participated in the IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA). High school business teacher, **Roxanne Delon**, worked with some of her Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) members and students in her business classes to offer this service to the students and the community to help them learn about tax preparation through the VITA program. During a 30-minute appointment, two IRS-certified student tax preparers worked with a taxpayer to



complete an intake form and begin their return. Following their appointment, an assigned preparer completed their tax return. Knowledge of the IRS tax concepts (filing status, # dependents, earned income tax credit, rent rebate, child tax credit, retirement income, interest and dividends, expense write-offs, etc) helped complete their tax return giving them the largest tax return. Afterwards, their return was verified by another IRS-certified student tax preparer. After your return has been processed, it was double-checked, returned to you, and finally submitted to the IRS.

Throughout the filing season, **Joanna Chen, Maddie Cowie, Owen Friend, Christian Thompson, and Emma Weaver** generously gave their time, energy, and expertise supporting our community in preparing income taxes. All of the students who participated in VITA have completed the training and are certified in the IRS's basic and advanced certification test. Community members scheduled an appointment online to come in to have their taxes prepared after school hours and on Saturdays.

Envirothon 2024

On **April 10, 2024,** The SAVE Club, run by science teacher **Brian Emler,** competed in the Beaver County Envirothon at the Brady's Run Park Lodge. The Envirothon is a competition that tests students' knowledge of Pennsylvania wildlife, aquatics, forestry, soils, and a special current events topic concerning the environment.
